Why Arizona Has Become One of the Most Important U.S. Expansion Markets for Canadian Companies, Institutional Investors, and Pension Funds

Arizona has rapidly emerged as one of the most strategically important destinations for Canadian corporate expansion, institutional investment, infrastructure development, and advanced manufacturing growth in the United States. 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1. Competitive Tax and Regulatory Environment

Arizona's tax structure has become one of the primary drivers attracting Canadian companies into the state.

By comparison, combined federal-provincial corporate tax burdens in provinces such as Ontario and British Columbia can exceed 26% depending on business structure and industry classification.
